Definition of Ecotourism

Ecotourism is a form of tourism that involves visiting natural areas in a manner that respects the environment and minimises adverse effects on ecosystems (TIES, 2015b).

Importance of Ecotourism

Pollution Generated by Tourism Activities

Water pollution: Some tourism activities may contaminate freshwater sources, including rivers and lakes.

Carbon emissions: Air and land transport used to reach natural destinations contributes to carbon emissions, which conflicts with the environmental objectives of ecotourism (TIES, 2015b).

Infrastructure Development and Its Adverse Effects

Infrastructure such as hotels, roads, and tourism facilities may be constructed to meet visitors' needs. Such development may result in:

Destruction of natural habitats: The construction of hotels and resorts may require deforestation or changes in land use.

Impacts on wildlife: Roads and facilities may destroy or fragment habitats, limiting the movement and reproduction of wildlife.

Neglect of Local Community Rights

In some cases, ecotourism projects are developed without involving local communities or respecting their rights. This may lead to:

Loss of land: Residents may be displaced from their land to establish nature reserves or tourism areas.

Unequal distribution of benefits: Local communities may not receive a fair share of ecotourism revenues because profits often accrue to large companies or external investors (United Nations Environment Programme, 2021).

Weak Legislation and Policy Frameworks

Unregulated tourism activities: Weak oversight may permit unsustainable practices such as poaching and tree felling.

Lack of long-term planning: Some countries lack sustainable strategies for managing ecotourism.

Climate Change and Its Effects

Climate change poses a major threat to natural areas and directly affects ecotourism. Its most significant effects include:

Rising temperatures: Higher temperatures degrade natural environments and alter wildlife habitats.

Flooding and drought: These events adversely affect natural areas and may make them less attractive to visitors.

Coral reef degradation: Rising ocean temperatures damage coral reefs and threaten ecotourism in marine areas (Al-Shammari, 2019).

Monitor environmental conditions: Use smart systems to monitor visitor numbers and air and water quality.

Improve resource efficiency: Adopt modern technologies for waste management and energy conservation.

Develop partnerships: Encourage cooperation among the public sector, the private sector, and civil society.

Exchange expertise: Organise workshops and conferences on sustainable tourism.

Strengthen cross-border cooperation: Promote regional and international collaboration to protect transboundary ecosystems.
