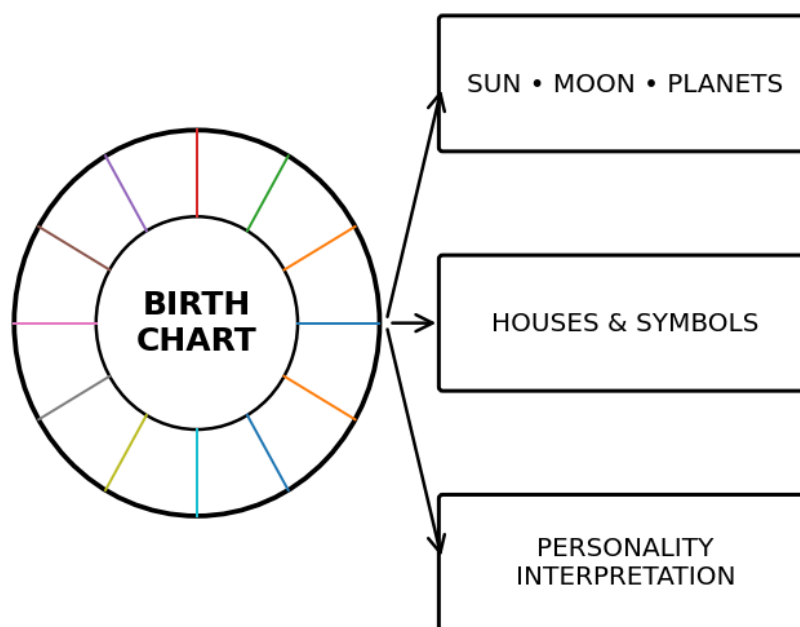


Figure 1. Birth chart and astrological personality analysis.
