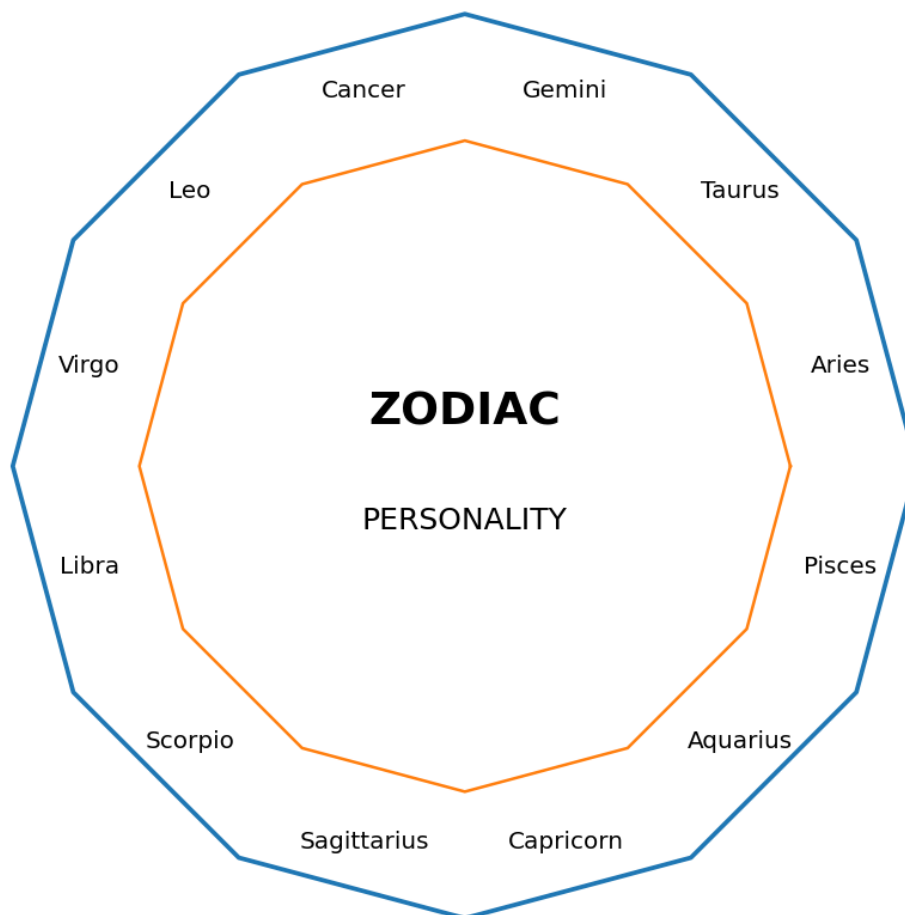


Figure 1. Simple zodiac illustration.
